The Colon

Can I use a colon correctly in a sentence? Can I understand how a colon makes my writing clearer for the reader?



The Colon

A colon (:) represents a pause in a sentence, longer than a comma but shorter than a full stop. Colons are not followed by a capital letter. A colon can introduce a list of items in a set of instructions. For example –

To build a model periscope you will need: a cardboard tube, two small mirrors, paper and sellotape. The colon **draws attention to the start of the list** and makes the writing clear.


