

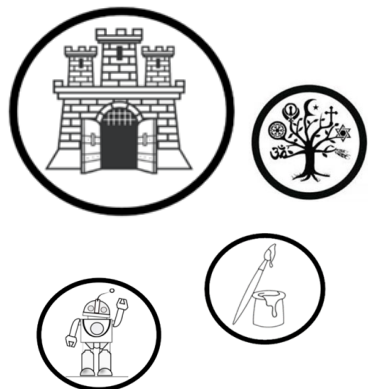

Topic - Mini-project - GARGOYLES

Can I find out information about gargoyles?

Can I create a fact-file?

Can I use drawing and photography to create records?



Tasks: You have a week to complete these tasks. Take time with your research and complete the tasks **which are possible for your household.**

◆ Fact-File

Re-read the information in your comprehension task. There is lots of information here as a starting point. Follow the web links given for more. I have attached a fact-file template for you to record your information. You can also present your facts in a Power Point or a Publisher document.

What is a gargoyle? Why are they a feature on churches? Where do gargoyles originate from? What shapes and features to gargoyles have? Can you study a particular church or cathedral as a case study? What is a 'face puller'?

◆ Church walk—gargoyle hunt

Take a walk to your local church. Can you spot any gargoyles? Where are they found on your church? How many can you spot? What are their form?

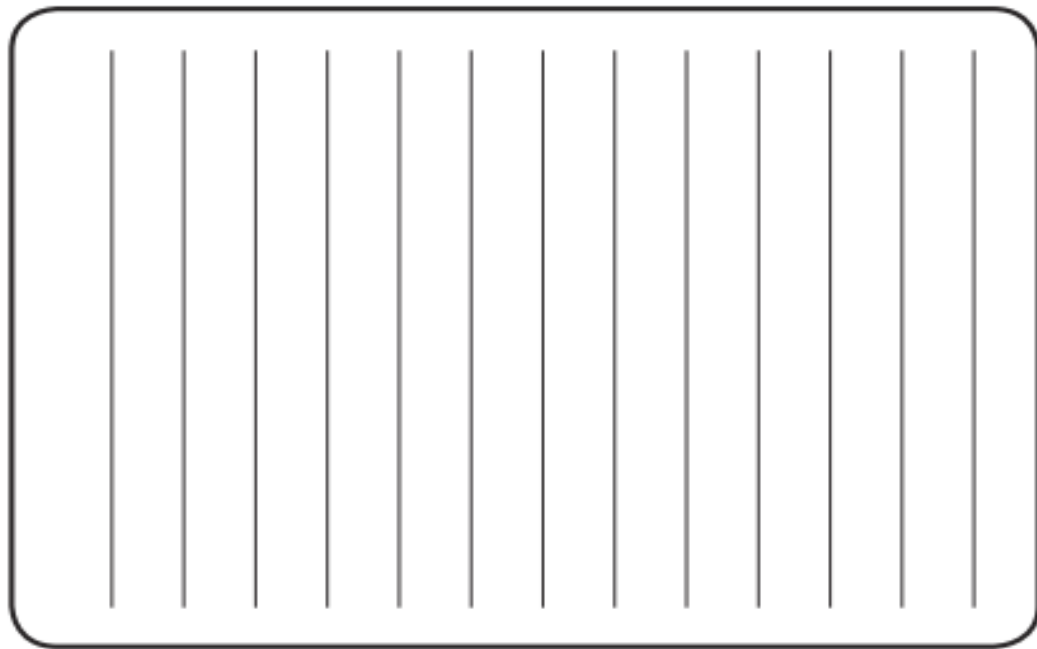
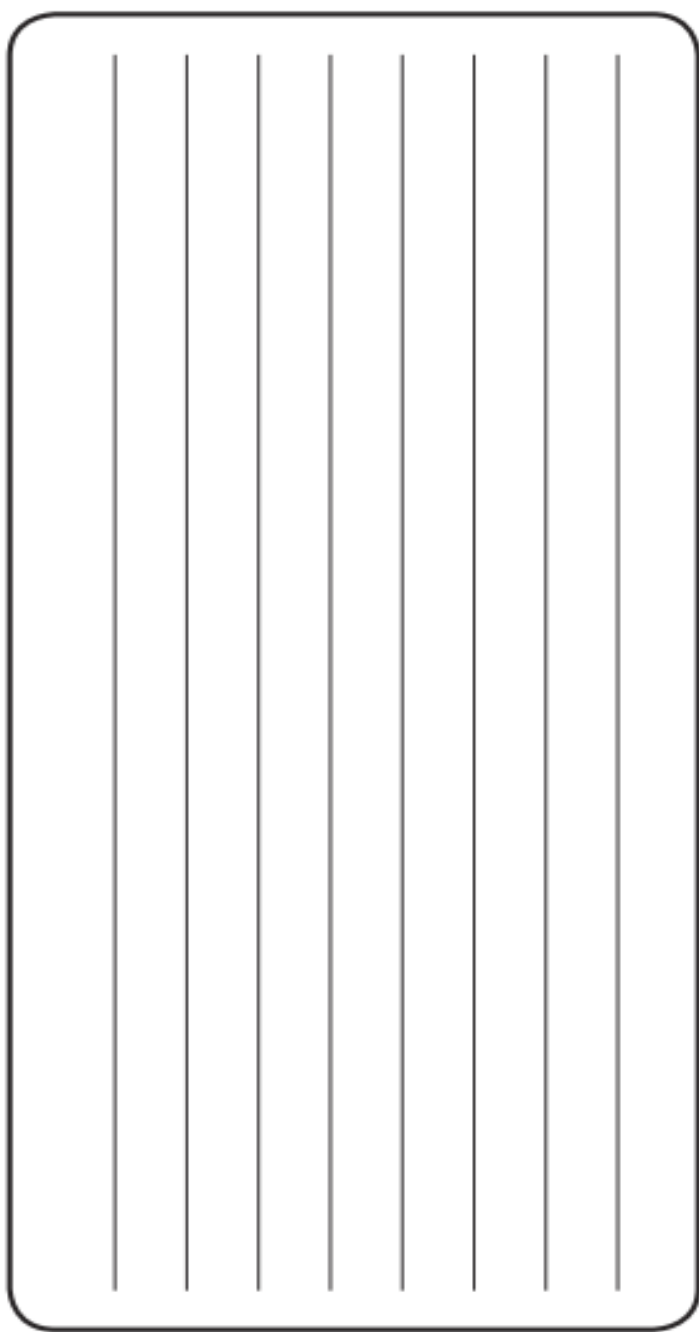
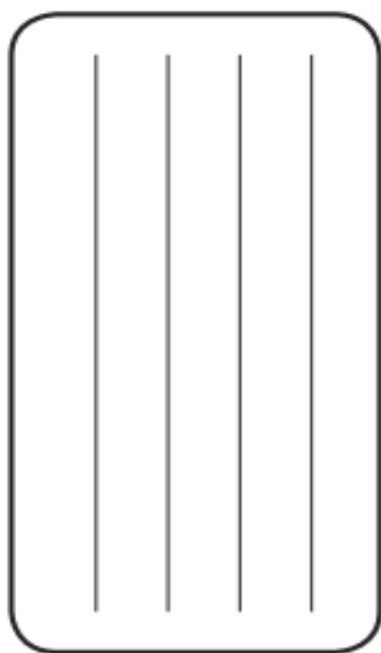
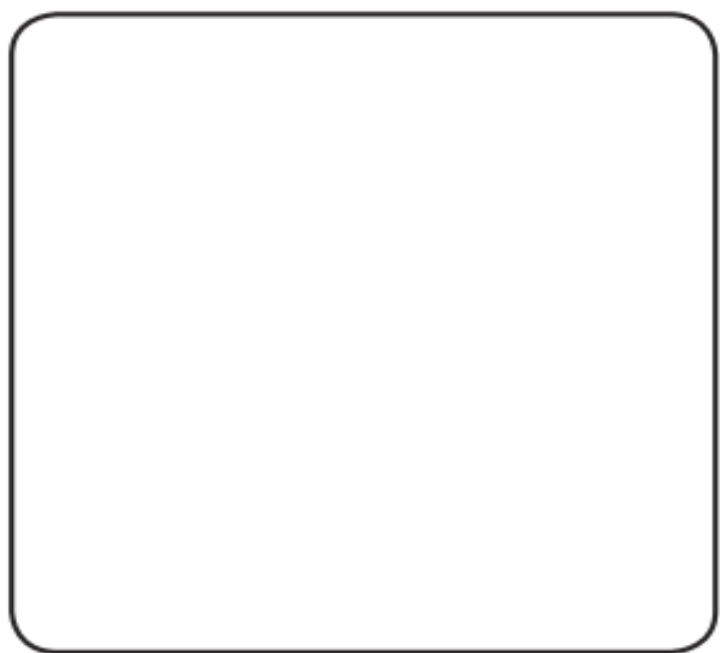
If your church does not have any gargoyles—what other sculptures or statues can you find? Sketch, draw and photograph any findings.

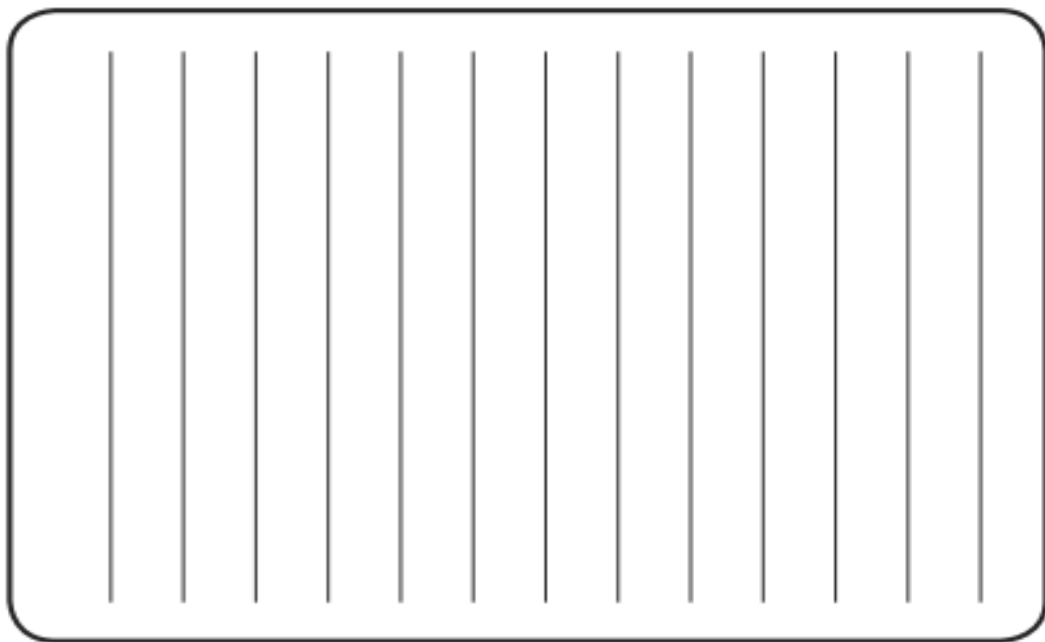
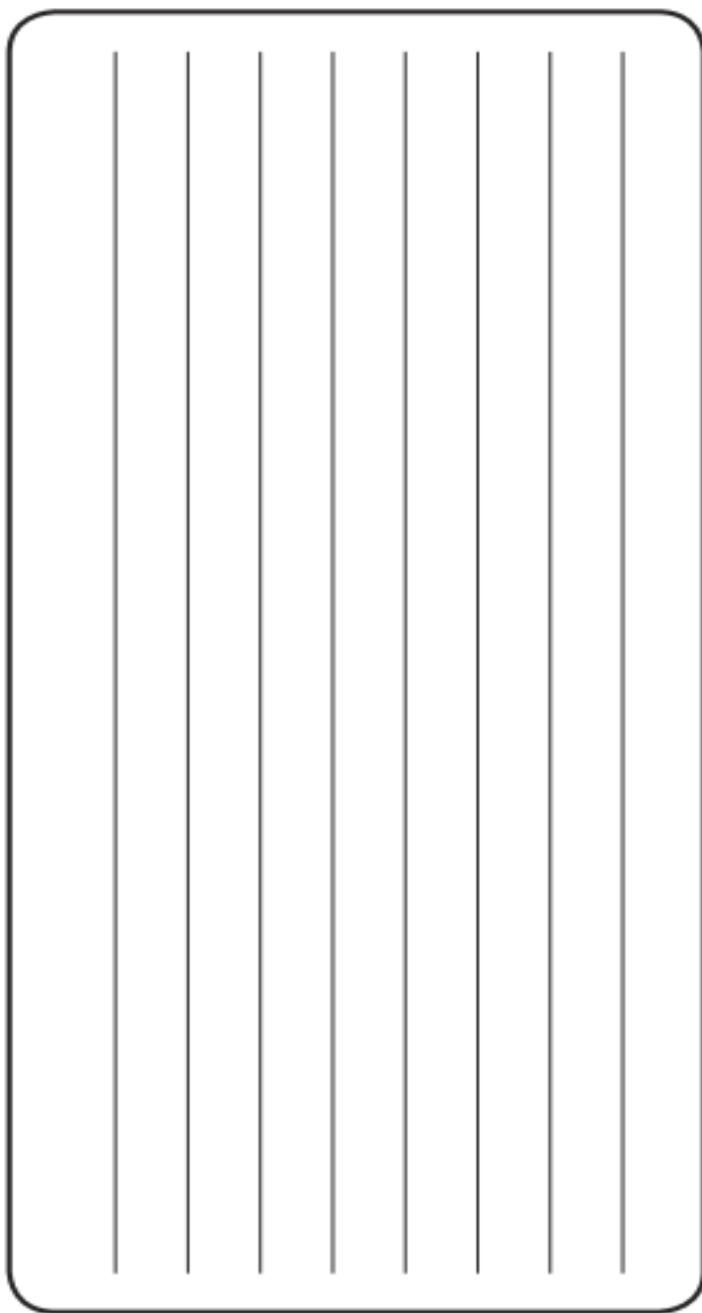
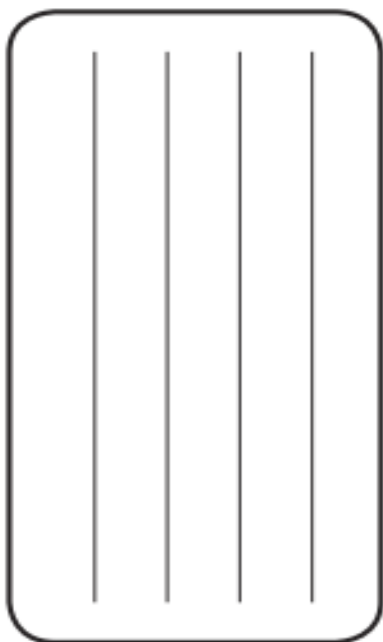
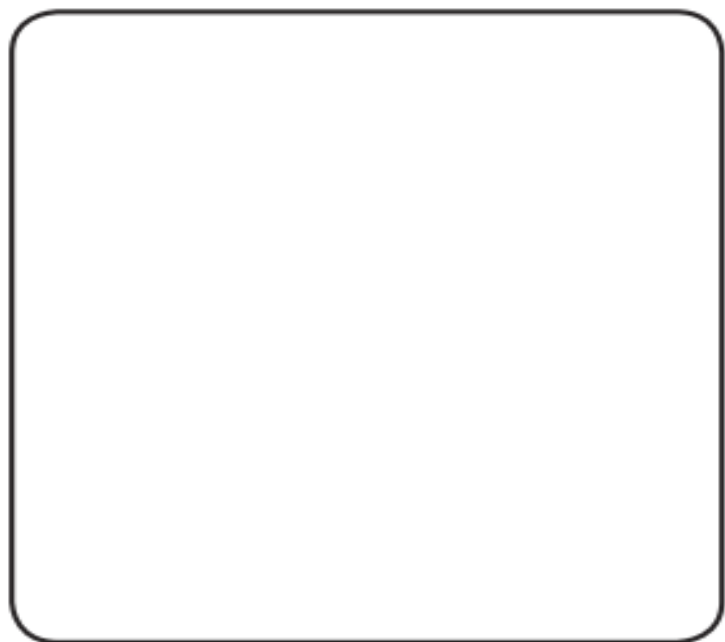
◆ Sketching/photography—gargoyles

Sketch and draw the gargoyles that you find. Take a photograph to record your results.

Alternatively, record different gargoyle characters from your internet research. For example, draw the gargoyles from the Notre-Dame Cathedral or York Minster. Norfolk Churches Trust is also a good place to start.

◆ Salt dough—gargoyle creation - Follow the recipe on page 5 to make and mould your own gargoyle. Please send me a photograph of your creation!





SALT DOUGH RECIPE

Makes 1 ball

Prep 10 minutes

Cook 3 hours

- 1 cupful of plain flour (about 250g)
- half a cupful of table salt (about 125g)
- half a cupful of water (about 125ml)

Method

1. Preheat the oven to its lowest setting and line a baking sheet with baking parchment.
2. Mix the flour and salt in a large bowl. Add the water and stir until it comes together into a ball.
3. Transfer the dough to a floured work surface and shape into your chosen model. You can roll it out and cut out shapes, numbers or letters using biscuit cutters, or make any kind of model you can think of. We made some fruit and veg shapes plus cupcakes for a teddy bear's picnic.
4. Put your finished items on the lined baking sheet and bake for 3 hrs or until solid.
5. Leave to cool and then paint.
