Find a story book and see how many of the consonant clusters you can find in your book. Which is your favourite word that you find? Can you use the word in a sentence? Can you write your sentence down, sounding out all the words carefully? Did you use any other clusters in your sentence?

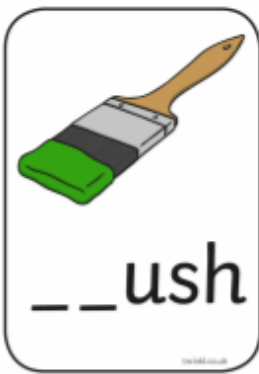
Activities: Here are 3 challenges for you for today.

Challenge 1: For maths today watch [Mr Gumpy's Outing](#). In the story, **first** Mr Gumpy wants to go out in his boat, **then** the children and animals did all the things that he had told them not to, **now** they have got to walk home. Can you make up a story (you could use your boat from yesterday) using **first**, **then** and **now**? As an extra challenge can you make up an addition story for example: **first** there was an otter in the boat, **then** a rabbit joined him and **now** there are two animals in the boat.

Challenge 2: Where do you live? Do you know your address? What village do you live in? Do you know what country you live in? Have you always lived there? See if you can find a map and find out where you live. What is it like where you live? Do you live in a town, a village or a city? Is it in the countryside? What other place names can you find that you have been to visit—maybe somewhere your grandparents live, or somewhere you have been on holiday. Have a look and see if they are surrounded by lots of other towns and villages or are they in open countryside or near the coast?

Challenge 3: In the picture we have seen from the book, Anna is pulling a large boat, so they must be planning on travelling by boat. Write a list of all the different ways of travelling that you can think of—be as creative as you can. Now think about the journeys you make—how do you make them, do you walk, ride, drive, fly, float? What form of transport have you never travelled on but would really love to? Why?

Something physical: How many.... in a minute. Time yourself and challenge a parent/sibling to see how many star jumps/hops/bunny hops/crab walks/pencil rolls/skips/jumps you can do in one minute.
